



Intricate Estonian-inspired lace patterns are worked in both a rectangular stole and a crescent shawllette. Traditional nupps add surface texture, with an option to replace the nupps with beads for sparkle.

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Finished measurements:

Stole: 20" / 51 cm wide by 80" / 203 cm long

Crescent: 16" / 40.5 cm wide by 62" / 157.5 cm long

All measurements are after blocking.

Yarn:

Stole: 1 skein SweetGeorgia Yarns Merino Silk Lace (765 yds / 700 m per 3 ½ oz / 100 g skein; 50% Fine Merino Wool, 50% Cultivated Silk) in Tourmaline

Crescent: 1 skein SweetGeorgia Yarns Merino Silk DK (380 yds / 347.5 m per 3 ½ oz / 100 g skein; 50% Fine Merino Wool, 50% Cultivated Silk) in Pistachio

Needles & Notions:

Stole: Size 7 US / 4.5 mm circular needle, 32" / 80 cm long; size 8 US / 5 mm needle (for bind off only)

Waste yarn for temporary cast on, tapestry needle, blocking pins

Crescent: Size 8 US / 5 mm circular needle, 32" / 80 cm long; size 9 US / 5.5 mm circular needle, 32" / 80 cm long; size 10 US / 6 mm needle (for bind off only)

90 size 6/0 4 mm beads; crochet hook size 14 / 0.75 mm (small enough to fit through holes of beads), tapestry needle, blocking pins

Gauge:

Stole: 16 sts and 26 rows = 4" / 10 cm in Stockinette stitch using size 7 US / 4.5 mm needles after blocking

Crescent: 14 sts and 24 rows = 4" / 10 cm in Stockinette stitch using size 8 US / 5 mm needles after blocking

Construction Notes: The rectangular stole begins with a provisional cast-on at the center and is worked out to one end. Stitches are recovered from the cast on and worked out to the other end. The crescent shawllette begins at the neck edge. Short rows provide the crescent shape, and the wide lace border is further shaped by changing needle size. These lace patterns are presented in chart form only.

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
